...leads to a new passion — playing Chess

Several children in last year’s Homework Help group showed an interest in learning to play chess and began to tackle the rudiments of the game after completing homework tasks. This September, thanks to teacher Adalberto Delgadillo, assisted by Bloomingdale Alumna Amanda Yopez, Bloomingdale launched its first Chess Club, where students from the Homework Help group are continuing to build their skills.



The Value of Chess

Adalberto and Amanda appreciate the intrinsic value of chess and its role in strengthening skills that young Bloomingdale alumni can extend to all aspects of their development. Some of the benefits young learners gain from playing chess include:

- *becoming effective problem solvers and decision makers.* In chess you have to make decisions influenced by your own judgment.
- *improving perception and the ability to concentrate.* The game requires focusing on a primary goal—to checkmate.
- *increasing perseverance and patience.* You need to wait for your opponent to move while figuring out a strategy to become the victor.
- *learning independence and self-motivation.* Chess encourages you to search for the best move, to plan ahead, and to adjust your plans as the game unfolds.
- *developing logical thinking, memory, and creativity.* The game encourages you to be inventive, to employ logic and strategy, and to memorize different opening patterns.
- *building skills related to science, math, technology, and social skills.* Chess develops a scientific way of thinking, involves various kinds of calculations, engages the player in a search for a better move in a limited amount of time, and enhances the ability to interact with others.

Because chess is a game for people of all ages, Adalberto and Amanda look forward to the day when their chess novices will be successfully taking on their parents and teachers.
